TennCare Kids parents, teens and adult members:

Two ways to keep the family healthy

Kids, teens, and young adults grow and change so fast! It's so important to make sure they stay healthy with each new step in life. That's why we cover two types of physicals every year:

1 **TennCare Kids checkup**

- Free for members under age 21
- A thorough, overall exam, including:
 - Health history.
 - Vision + hearing check.
 - Dental check.
 - Shots.
 - A complete physical exam.
- Growth and behavior screening, as needed.
- Lab tests (if needed). General tips about staying healthy.

Remember, children, teens and young adults need a TennCare Kids checkup every year, even if they feel fine. This visit helps the doctor find and treat problems early. If your child hasn't had a checkup in the past year, call their primary care provider (PCP) today for an appointment.

(2) Sports physical

- Free for school-age kids and teens
- Checks to make sure the body can handle starting new sports
- Often checks:
 - Health history.
 - Vision.
 - Height and weight.
 - Blood pressure and pulse.
 - Heart, lungs and abdomen.



- Joints, flexibility and strength.
- That no parts of the body are at risk for injury.

Sports physicals are only needed if you haven't had a TennCare Kids checkup in the last year, and want to sign up for a sports team.

Signing up for sports?

The school will need a copy of either the TennCare Kids checkup or sports physical. To do this, either:



- Ask the doctor for a paper copy. Then deliver the copy to the school.
- Fill out a release form so the doctor can mail or fax it directly to the school.





What's a transplant?

A type of surgery that can save lives. It's when a healthy organ or tissue (a group of cells formed in other parts of the body) is removed from one person, and given (transplanted) to another person whose organ or tissues were injured or failed.

What if you need a transplant?

Your health plan covers organ and tissue transplants, including, but not limited to those listed. Your doctor may add you to the UNOS transplant list or refer you to an organ transplant center. To find an organ match, they often have to find organs or tissues that are the correct size, and from people with the same blood type.

Common transplants	Common reasons why they're needed
Cornea	Vision problems caused by keratoconus or other injuries, thinning, or scarring of the cornea
Bone marrow (aka a stem cell transplant)	To treat certain types of bone cancer and blood diseases
Kidney	Kidney failure from things like diabetes and high blood pressure
Pancreas	To treat diabetes and sometimes cancer
Liver	Hepatitis B and C, drinking too much alcohol (causing liver disease and failure), genetic diseases (that run in your family), cancer, and more
Heart	Heart disease, disease of the arteries or birth defects
Lung	Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and pulmonary fibrosis (often caused by smoking or asthma), cystic fibrosis
Small bowel	When the bowel can no longer get enough nutrients from food due to certain health conditions



According to the United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS), nearly




40,000 transplants happened in 2019. Yet, there are still over 100,000 people

Chlamydia is one of the **most COMMON** sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in the U.S.



It normally shows **no symptoms**.

It can **damage** your reproductive organs so that you can no longer have children.

It's easily treated with antibiotics.

The test is **easy, quick** (you often get results in a few days) and covered by your health plan! You can get screened anytime.

If you're sexually active, you should get tested once every year. Reduce your risk of STIs by using a new condom every time you have sex.


With your TennCare Connect account, you'll be able to:

Newborn testing for PKU

Are you welcoming a new baby into the world? **Congratulations!**

In the first few days of life, the doctor needs to run a few tests. One of them includes checking for phenylketonuria, or PKU for short.

What is PKU?

PKU is a rare disease when the body can't break down an amino acid called phenylalanine. Phenylalanine is found in almost all foods with protein. When the body can't break it down, it builds up in our blood. When levels get too high, it can cause:

- Brain damage.
- Seizures.
- Intellectual disability.

With early testing and treatment, those problems can be prevented! We cover the PKU test and other medical services, including special, low-protein baby formula.



Most doctors are required to test for PKU. If you have questions, **talk to your doctor** about this and other screenings to expect.

If you think you need long-term care services, call 1-866-840-4991 (TRS 711).


No car? No ride? We'll pick you up!
